Course Title: Interpersonal Communication

Course Abbreviation and Number: CMM 2500

Credit Hours: 3

Course Type: Lecture

Course Description: Students will develop their ability to examine the interpersonal communication they are likely to encounter in their personal and professional lives. They will describe their interpersonal communication style, and understand the roles played by such factors as verbal and non-verbal cues, communication climate, intimacy, distance, and conflict. Students also learn to recognize obstacles to effective interpersonal communication and develop strategies for overcoming these obstacles.

- Identity development and the historical/societal factors that shape our understanding of common identity categories, including but not limited to race, class, sexual orientation, and gender.
 - Power and privilege as defined and perpetuated by interpersonal communication.
 - Foundational concepts of interpersonal communication including: language, listening, verbal/nonverbal communication, perception, conflict, emotional intelligence, and relationship development.
 - Interpersonal communication across a variety of settings: friendships, romantic relationships, family, and the workplace.
