Course Title: Ethics in Criminal Justice

Course Abbreviation and Number: CRI 2550

Course Type: Lecture

Course Description: Students will explore many of the ethical problems confronting legal system personnel, including police, lawyers, judges, and corrections personnel. Course materials will focus on ethical systems, the concepts of law and justice, and various real life ethical dilemmas.
