INSTITUTIONAL COURSE SYLLABUS

Course Title: Interviewing and Counseling

Course Abbreviation and Number: HUS 2230 Credit Hours: 3

Course Type: Lecture

Course Description: Students will develop entry level interviewing skills appropriate for work in human services agencies. Counseling theory and techniques of interviewing are emphasized. Students will learn about the therapeutic relationship, non-verbal and verbal communication, multicultural interviewing, and crisis intervention. A variety of clinical techniques are discussed through role playing and case discussions.

Prerequisite: PSY 1510.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Students who demonstrate understanding can:

- 1. Demonstrate beginning skills in interviewing including accurate responding, reflection and clarification.
- 2. Identify various theoretical approaches to counseling, including behavioral, systems theory and utilizing serveral modalities.
- 3. Identify cultural, ethical and values issues that affect the counseling relationship.

Topics Covered:

- Beginning phase of the interview process
 - \circ Definition of an interview
 - o Environmental considerations in the interview process
 - Personal presentation o the interviewer
 - 3 foundations to effective interviewing
- Exploration of the therapeutic relationship
 - Concrete aspects to relationship building including specific verbal and non-verbal behaviors
 - Abstract concepts that favor the development of a relationship including confidentiality, acceptance, client self-determinism and non-judgmental attitude
- Early phase skills and techniques in the interview process
 - o Development of early phase skills: positive connotation, paraphrasing, reflecting, probing,
 - Clarification
 - o Discussion of which situations call for these particular techniques
 - Development and use of effectively worded questions as an aid to the interview process
 - Use of the problem formulation outline to determine the focus of the interview
- Middle phase processes and techniques
 - Development of goal setting techniques
 - Establishment of the therapeutic contract
 - Development of therapeutic assignments
 - Use of middle phase techniques: reframe, paradox, normalization
 - Interview processes: transference, counter-transference, over-identification
