Course Title: History of World Religions

Course Abbreviation and Number: ANT 2570

Credit Hours: 3

Course Type: Lecture

Course Description: This interdisciplinary course examines the development and variety of religious belief in the past and present. Historical, prehistoric, and non-literary traditions are examined, including Native American, African, Asian, Indo-European, and Semitic beliefs. Special consideration is given to religious development, assimilation, diffusion, practices, and phenomena. Cross-cultural comparisons and the key tenets of today's world faiths are also emphasized.

Eligibility: ENG 1510 without supports or Corequisite: ENG 1510 with supports.
