INSTITUTIONAL COURSE SYLLABUS

Course Title: Studio Problems - Ceramics

Course Abbreviation and Number: ART 1610Credit Hours: VariableCourse Type:Lecture/Lab

Course Description: Students will build upon previous studio course experiences in advanced studio production courses under art faculty supervision. Students who have completed the basic and intermediate (as applicable) courses in drawing, ceramics, photography, electronic arts, design or painting, may register for one, two, or three hours of credit per semester in a studio course in that medium. Students are expected to spend two hours in studio work each week for each credit hour anticipated. Studio problem courses are student initiated with each student, together with the faculty member, creating an acceptable course outline and evaluation process for the work of the semester. In some cases, a group studio problem experience may be initiated by visual arts faculty. Students achieving 12 credit hours in art studio problems must obtain permission from the arts and humanities dean to take additional coursework (for credit) in art.

Prerequisite: permission of instructor required.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- Students who demonstrate understanding can:
 - 1. Demonstrate ceramic cycles and ceramic studio operations
 - 2. Mix clay by batch recipe
 - 3. Utilize slab construction techniques and modeling processes while creating a larger than life size copy of an object
 - 4. Demonstrate beginning skills of working on potter's wheel
 - 5. Demonstrate the art of Pull handles
 - 6. Utilize technique in plaster mixing and bat fabrication
 - 7. Produce a variety of shapes by slab, coil, pinch, and thrown clay forms
 - 8. Apply glaze techniques and ability to mix ceramic glaze recipes (Glaze tile project)
 - 9. Verbalize the value of class critiques of work
 - 10. Prepare, load, fire, and unload ceramic kilns
 - 11. Discuss ceramic history in various regions of the world
 - 12. Articulate about ceramic studio processes and activities
 - 13. Analyze the individual focus of the targeted achievement

Topics Covered:

- Focused theme of the target achievement for the semester
- Ceramic cycle, studio operation
- Hand building: pinch, coil, slab, hump, sling
- Wheel demonstrations: centering, cylinders
- Wheel demonstrations: functional forms (mugs, bowls, pitchers, teapot, etc.)
- Handles: pulled, coiled, cut extruded
- Firing procedures, kiln designs, fuels, atmospheres
- Kiln stacking and ceramic cones
- Experimental glaze tiles
- Glaze mixing and applications
- Complete series of work with aesthetical continuity
- Critique
