# INSTITUTIONAL COURSE SYLLABUS

Course Title: Intro to TV Production

Course Abbreviation and Number: CMM 1630 Credit Hours: 3 Course Type: Lecture/Lab

**Course Description:** Students are introduced to the cameras and sound, lighting, mixing, recording, and graphic tools used to produce television programming. Working in teams to produce live-to-tape programs, students are given the opportunity to acquire producing, directing, writing for electronic media, and live editing skills.

- 7. Critique productions, analyze failures and successes, and identify ways to improve future work
