Course Title: Interpersonal Communication

Course Abbreviation and Number: CMM 2500 Credit Hours: 3 Course Type: Lecture

Course Description: Students will explore the foundational concepts, theories, and practices of interpersonal communication by examining how communication influences relationships in personal, professional, and social contexts. Through hands-on activities, written reflections, discussions, and case studies, students will enhance their ability to communicate effectively, empathetically, and ethically in diverse situations. By the end of the course, students will be equipped to navigate complex communication challenges and build meaningful and healthy interpersonal relationships.

Topics Covered:

- Identity development and the historical/societal factors that shape our understanding of common identity categories, including but not limited to race, class, sexual orientation, and gender.
- Power and privilege as defined and perpetuated by interpersonal communication.
- Foundational concepts of interpersonal communication including: language, listening, verbal/nonverbal communication, perception, conflict, emotional intelligence, and relationship development.
- Interpersonal communication across a variety of settings: friendships, romantic relationships, family, and the workplace.
