MASTER COURSE SYLLABUS

Course Title: Infant/Toddler/Development/Edu

Course Abbreviation and Number: EDU 2150

Credit Hours: 3

Course Type: Lecture

Course Description: Students will increase their knowledge about the developmental needs and program requirements for infants and toddlers. They will do this by strengthening their observation skills, reading, and discussing current research and trends in infant/toddler care, and applying theory in field experiences. Students will plan and implement developmentally appropriate activities based on the needs of a specific child or groups of children within their field setting. Special attention will be given to the development of the whole child, the child as the curriculum, respectful and responsive relationships, intentional and purposeful interactions, and the environment as a teaching tool. A minimum of 20 hours will be spent in the field experience.

Prerequisite: EDU 1290.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Students who demonstrate understanding can:

1. Observe, record and assess the development of an infant/toddler for the purpose of refining observation skills, building a relationship with a child/family and connecting theory with application (knowing what, why and how).
 2. Demonstrate understanding in implementing developmentally appropriate programs for infants and toddlers; including understanding current research and trends in infant/toddler care, state regulations governing such programs, respectful and responsive relationships, creating a meaningful environment and increasing awareness about the role of a caregiver as a professional.
 3. Use their increased knowledge of and understanding about how infants and toddlers grow and learn in or order to design opportunities that support their physical, social, emotional, cognitive, and aesthetic development and plan developmentally appropriate curriculum based on individual children, families, community and the curriculum goals and content of the field experience.
