Course Title: 20th Century US History through Film

Course Description: Students will explore the social and cultural trends of 20th century America through this historical analysis of a variety of motion pictures such as The Birth of a Nation, The Grapes of Wrath, Salt of the Earth, and Thelma and Louise. By focusing on the diversity of the American experience through an analysis of film as a primary historical source, students will discover how concepts of power, gender, social class, cultural identify, race/ethnicity emerge, are perceived, contested, and change over time and space. Students will employ historical analysis in reviewing eight films and completing a film treatment on themes of the early 21st century.
