Course Title: Psychosocial Concepts/Techniques

Course Abbreviation and Number: OTA 1620

Course Type: Lecture/Lab

Course Description: Students will be introduced to current occupational therapy and psychological models of care to address the complex needs of individuals with psychiatric and neurobehavioral disorders. Content surrounding mental health theories and trends, diagnoses and medications will be explored. Occupation-based assessment and intervention techniques will be explored and practiced in this course. Through hands on experiences, students will develop individual and group treatment sessions in clinical environment that mirror best practices in mental health.

Prerequisite/Corequisite: PSY 2560.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Students who demonstrate understanding can:

- 1. Educate peers on evidence based remedial and compensatory interventions and strategies focusing on mental health conditions and health and wellness promotion.
- 2. Select appropriate interventions for common mental health challenges.
- 3. Engage in the consultative process with intra and interprofessional team members, utilizing effective communication skills.
- 4. Demonstrate clinical reasoning to address occupation based interventions.

- Mental health/wellness and psychiatric diagnoses through the lifespan
- Addiction
- Pharmacology
