Course Title: Survey of Islamic Studies

**Course Description:** This class will examine the Islamic religious tradition from its inception to the present. The course will culminate with a few specific modern social issues and political movements important to practitioners of the Islamic faith. Prerequisite: ENG 1510. J occasionally; C occasionally.

- Later Political, Theological, and Mystical developments in Islam
  - Historical background: from the 'Abbasids to the Mongols
  - Early theology (kalam)—the Qadari controversy
  - Later theology—the Mu'tazili
