JAMESTOWN COMMUNITY COLLEGE & MEDAILLE COLLEGE MASTER ARTICULATION AGREEMENT and ADOLESCENCE/SPECIAL EDUCATION -BIOLOGY COURSE EQUIVALENCIES

This document establishes a transfer articulation agreement between Jamestown Community College and Medaille College. Its purpose is to afford students the opportunity to pre-plan their college careers, and to facilitate the transfer process from an Associate in Arts (AA) or Associate in Science (AS) degree program at Jamestown Community College to a parallel Bachelor of Arts (BA), Bachelor of Science (BS), or Bachelor of Science in Education (BSED) degree program at Medaille College.

TERMS OF AGREEMENT

- Students who graduate from Jamestown Community College with an AA or AS degree and who have also achieved a minimum cumulative Jamestown Community College grade point average (GPA) of 2.5 are guaranteed admission with full junior status into the parallel BA, BS, or BSED degree program at Medaille College.
- 2. Medaille College will transfer a minimum of 60 Jamestown Community College credit hours toward meeting requirements for the Medaille College parallel degree.

Students can also choose to transfer additional Jamestown Community College credit hours. The maximum allowed number of transferrable Jamestown Community College credits from Appendix A toward meeting requirements for each Medaille College degree is:

- 63 credit hours toward the Accounting BS,
- 81 credit hours toward the Adolescence/Special Education (7-12) Biology BSED,
- 62 credit hours toward the Adolescence/Special Education (7-12) English BSED,
- 69 credit hours toward the Adolescence/Special Education (7-12) Social Studies BSED,
- 90 credit hours toward the Biology BS,
- 78 credit hours toward the Communication BS,
- 90 credit hours toward the Criminal Justice (Juvenile & Family Justice Concentration) BS
- 90 credit hours toward the Criminal Justice (Law Enforcement Administration & Criminal Investigation Concentration) BS
- 90 credit hours toward the Criminal Justice (Law & Society Concentration) BS
- 90 credit hours toward the Criminal Justice (Homeland Security & Emergency Management Concentration) BS
- 66 credit hours toward the Early Childhood/Childhood BSED,
- 78 credit hours toward the English BA,
- 90 credit hours toward the Liberal Studies BS,
- 90 credit hours toward the Psychology BA, and
- 69 credit hours toward the Sport Management BS.

When a Jamestown Community College course carries more credits than an equivalent Medaille College course, the excess credits will transfer as elective credits.

- a. For example, MAT 1600 Pre-Calculus (4 credits) will transfer as MAT 115 Pre-Calculus (3 credits) plus 1 credit of MAT electives.
- 3. Students who earn a Jamestown Community College degree listed in Appendix A (with a minimum of 60 credit hours) are guaranteed the opportunity to earn the parallel bachelor's degree with four continuous semesters of full-time study at the normal coursework rate of 15 or more credits per semester at Medaille College.

- a. Students who complete the BS Accounting degree and meet Medaille's gateway GPA requirement to continue into the graduate component are guaranteed acceptance into the Master of Science (MS) Accounting degree program at Medaille College.
- 4. Both Medaille College and Jamestown Community College agree to encourage qualified students to participate in this program by providing information, advisement, and assistance to prospective students.
- 5. Proposed changes in policies or curricula by either party should be communicated in writing to the other party.
- 6. Either party may independently cancel this agreement by notifying the other party in writing no less than one year before the intended date of cancellation.
- 7. This agreement will be reviewed by both institutions every three (3) years. This is to begin with the semester in which this document first takes effect. Thus, the document will be subject to review in the spring of 2021. Failure to conduct a review will in no way affect the terms of the agreement.
- 8. Both parties can use this agreement and the names Jamestown Community College and Medaille College in all promotional activities including college catalogs and recruitment and advisement activities.
- 9. Jamestown Community College and Medaille College may from time to time add additional parallel programs by means of addenda to this agreement.
