Major Giving: By the Numbers

\$3,000 *Stitt Family Entrepreneurial Internship Program*

The goal of this program is to provide students with opportunities to apply their classroom learning to real-world experiences with local business professionals that will further their entrepreneurship education and strengthen their preparedness for both continued education and entrepreneurial development.

\$6,300 *The Advanced Manufacturing Summer Camp*

The JCC Foundation provided the college with funds for the Advanced Manufacturing Summer Camp, an innovative way to introduce and educate students in grades 9 through 12 to advanced manufacturing careers, the manufacturing design process, and JCC's Manufacturing Technology Institute. Each day is structured by various activities, including manufacturing company tours, lectures, and hands-on manufacturing demonstrations.

\$7,600 *Manley Memorial Trust*

The JCC Foundation received money to purchase a Polycom video system for distance learning initiatives in the nursing program.

\$10,000 *Andrew Kibler Memorial Transfer Scholarship*

JCC Reaccredited By Middle States Commission

In late 2016, JCC received what Marilyn Zagora, vice president of academic affairs, described as “an outstanding report” from the Middle States Commission on Higher Education, the organization charged with overseeing the quality of JCC’s instructional programs and operation.

“The report reflects the ongoing efforts of all members of the college community to pursue and maintain the highest quality in all our endeavors in the time since our last review in 2010-11,” Dr. Zagora said. “We are exceptionally proud of this outcome which could not have occurred without a shared commitment to advancing college goals.”

“The periodic review report is part of a comprehensive evaluation of JCC’s progress in meeting specific goals and measure of success,” JCC president Cory L. Duckworth added.

“The Middle States Commission response to our report came with high praise and demonstrates JCC’s continued emphasis on providing exceptional educational programs for the community. This is a significant feather in the cap of the many wonderful employees who work hard to achieve such excellent results.”

Four peer reviewers from other institutions read and analyzed the report on JCC’s mission and goals, performance, and resources.

The report allows “JCC to reflect on the progress we’ve made on achieving the goals we established in the 2010-2011 self-study as well as set the stage for our next Middle States Commission evaluation in five years,” Dr. Zagora noted.

Sheldon Foundation Gift Will Enhance Music Facilities

JCC and the JCC Foundation received a major gift from the Ralph C. Sheldon Foundation for renovation of music facilities on the Jamestown Campus in January 2017.

The Sheldon Foundation has awarded a \$1.1 million grant that will enable JCC to upgrade classrooms, equipment, and facilities for the music program in the Arts & Sciences Center. Completion of the \$5 million project is expected by fall 2018.

For many years and through several important initiatives, the Sheldon Foundation has provided financial support to JCC, noted Kirk D. Young, vice president of enrollment management and institutional advancement.

“The foundation’s contributions have greatly enhanced the college’s ability to perform its critical mission,” said Dr. Young. Throughout its history, the Sheldon Foundation has contributed nearly \$5 million to the college.



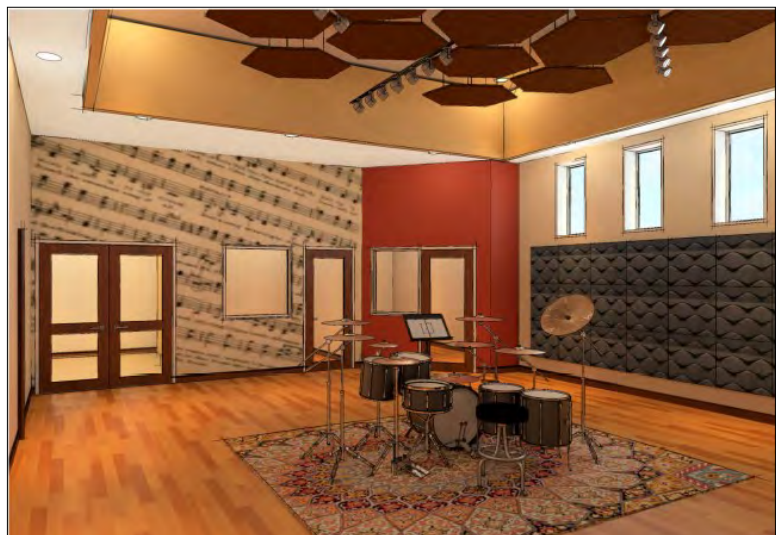
JCC president Cory Duckworth said, “The Arts & Sciences Center provides educational opportunities for our students in a variety of academic disciplines. It is essential that we continue to renew this facility to remain at the forefront of providing high quality programs.

JCC, Allegheny College Sign Transfer Agreement

A new articulation agreement will enhance the transfer of JCC graduates into Allegheny College's environmental science degree program.

The agreement guarantees JCC graduates acceptance, with junior standing, into Allegheny's highly rated bachelor's degree program in environmental science. Students must have completed JCC's environmental science degree and meet a minimum cumulative grade point average requirement to be considered for the program at Allegheny.

Students who complete courses identified in the agreement as part of their associate's degree should be able to complete the bachelor's degree in four semesters at Allegheny.

"Allegheny and JCC share a similar passion for our students," said Ron Cole, provost and dean of Allegheny College. "We are excited for the access to educational opportunities provided with this agreement and to building on this relationship."

"JCC's articulation agreement with Allegheny expands the ways in which students can take advantage of the top-notch academic programs available at both institutions," said Marilyn A. Zagora, JCC's vice president of academic affairs. "We look forward to helping students make use of this agreement, and we'll continue to explore ways to further develop our partnership with Allegheny."

JCC's environmental science degree is designed to help meet the academic and professional needs of students seeking careers related to environmental science and other disciplines associated with the intersection of nature, human institutions, and scientific study.

"Allegheny's environmental science department has long been dedicated to teaching students to solve real-world environmental problems," noted Professor Eric Pallant, department chair. "More than a dozen Allegheny faculty with exceptional breadth and depth in environmental problem-solving work shoulder-to-shoulder with students to make the world more sustainable."

SUNY Select Partnership Announced

The three State University of New York institutions in southwestern New York have formed a new partnership that will create opportunities for students to earn associate, bachelor's, and master's degrees at a single location.

Titled SUNY Select, the collaboration unites JCC, SUNY Fredonia, and SUNY Empire State College in a first-of-its-kind partnership in New York that will provide students with seamless degree completion pathways.

"We have long sought to serve our students in a more comprehensive manner while better meeting area employer needs," explained JCC president Cory L. Duckworth. "This partnership will provide students with the flexibility to begin and complete degrees where they choose. Our collaborative vision is to enhance and create opportunities, optimize resources, and nurture student success."

"While this is an ambitious and complex project, we are confident that our students will be well-served," said Dr. Virginia S. Horvath, Fredonia president. "We understand that today's students face numerous time and resource challenges and that we must be more responsive to their needs."

Merodie A. Hancock, SUNY Empire State College president agreed. "SUNY Empire has always offered individualized programs through flexible means. Partnership with JCC and Fredonia will provide greater opportunities for student success by leveraging the academic programs, student support and modes of delivery of all three colleges."

To date, SUNY Select has been shaped by a preliminary visioning committee comprised of representatives of the three higher education partners. The joint committee will continue its work throughout the 2017-2018 academic year in hopes of marketing the program for implementation in the 2019-20 academic year.

Committee members include Maria Kindberg, JCC's dean of arts, humanities, and health sciences; Nelson Garifi, JCC's executive director of academic innovation; Judith Horowitz, Fredonia associate provost; Dan Tramuta, Fredonia assistant vice president of enrollment services; Nikki Shrimpton, Empire State College dean; and Clayton Steen, Empire State College vice president of enrollment management.

SUNY Select calls upon the partners to engage in higher levels of collaboration in such areas as curriculum planning, facility sharing, advisement, scheduling, engagement via technology, and data sharing. Upon implementation, the program will offer up to eight academic programs with the intention of adding additional programs in future years.

JCC Foundation Honors Kirks And Dresser-Rand

The JCC Foundation honored Jon and Judy Kirk and Dresser-Rand Co. during its annual recognition event in 2016. Dresser-Rand received the foundation's Community Partner Award.

The Kirks received the foundation's John D. Hamilton Award, which was established in 1995 to recognize individuals whose contributions exemplify those of Hamilton, a past president and trustee emeritus of JCC.

Kirk, chief financial officer at SolEpoxy Inc., served as a member of the JCC Foundation board of directors from 1998 to 2008. He has been recognized in the community with a Paul Harris Fellow

Award and the YMCA Salute to Olean Award.

After earning a bachelor's degree in accounting at the University of Kentucky, Kirk began his career at American Brands Corporation, later WR Case & Sons, as a cost accountant. He was the materials manager at Dexter Corporation and Henkel Corporation and retired as senior vice president of manufacturing and officer at Henkel of America in 2009.

Kirk has served on the Rotary Club of Olean, United Way, Bartlett Country Club, and The Rehabilitation Center Foundation boards of directors.

Mrs. Kirk, a former elementary teacher in Bradford, graduated from Villa Maria College with a bachelor's degree in early childhood education. She has been a preschool tutor and an active volunteer for Little League baseball, soccer, and football organizations and spent many years as a March of Dimes volunteer. She also served on the JCC's Scholarship Classic Golf Tournament committee.

Dresser-Rand, a leading supplier of mission-critical, high-speed rotating equipment solutions to the worldwide oil, gas, petrochemical, and process industries, has supported emerging programs as well as capital projects at JCC. The company was essential in the development of the Cattaraugus County Campus in Olean. The Dresser-Rand Training and Conference Center was established in an historic railroad depot on the campus to house the Center for Continuing Education.

In 2013 Dresser-Rand established the Dresser-Rand USA Scholarship Fund with preference given to engineering students from Cattaraugus and Allegany counties. The Unified Student Assistance (USA) Scholarship awards up to the full New York state resident tuition for two years of study to seniors graduating in the top 20% of their class from an accredited high school in JCC's service area.

New Academic Programs Provide New Opportunities

SUNY and the New York State Education Department approved several new degrees and certificates in 2016 and 2017 which will enhance JCC's curricular offerings.

Addictions Counseling Degree, Certificate

Approval was received in fall 2017 for JCC to offer Associate in Science and certificate programs degrees in addictions counseling on the Jamestown Campus.

"Our faculty are to be commended for developing this timely and important academic program that reflects JCC's commitment to serving emerging community needs," said Marilyn Zagora, vice president of academic affairs. "We are ready to prepare additional professionals for the addictions counseling field who will make a difference in the lives of countless individuals and have a positive impact on the quality of life in our region."

Each program, designed for individuals who are interested in employment in alcohol, substance abuse, or other addiction treatment, focuses on the nature and history of addiction and chemical dependency. Students will learn how to do intake assessment, develop treatment plans, and conduct individual and group counseling through credentialed alcoholism and substance abuse counselor courses approved by the state's Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services.

Graduates of the degree program will fulfill New York state's education requirements for a credentialed alcohol and substance abuse counselor in training (CASAC-TR) license. The certificate program is designed for individuals who are pursuing or already hold a degree in human services, social work, nursing, criminal justice, or a related field and want the CASAC knowledge and experience working within the addictions field.


"Professional counselors, licensed mental health counselors, social workers, nurses, and therapists who already have bachelor's and master's degrees can supplement their current portfolio with the CASAC-TR credential," said Catherine Iannello, MSW, associate professor of human services.

Besides coursework required for completion of the degree or certificate, students in each program will do a 135-hour internship in an addictions agency. A significant portion of the coursework can be done online.

"Our region needs trained professionals who understand addiction," said Ms. Iannello, "and employers need certified addiction clinicians. JCC's new programs will help meet a distinct community need."

She emphasized that occupations linked to substance abuse treatment and counseling are among the few professions in western New York and northwestern Pennsylvania with projected employment growth, at approximately 95 new workers per year for the next decade.

According to the New York State Department of Health's county opioid quarterly report published last July, almost 1,200 admissions were made to OASAS treatment centers for opioid addictions alone in 2016 in Chautauqua, Cattaraugus, and Allegany counties. The region also recorded 59 deaths of an opioid overdose and 282 individuals treated for an opioid overdose in an emergency room or hospital from 2015-2016.

Sport Management Degrees

JCC received approval in summer 2017 to offer Associate in Science and Associate in Applied Science degrees in sport management on the Jamestown Campus.

The degrees are geared toward students who want to be involved in sports but who do not necessarily want to teach physical education.

“The degrees allow students the choice of transferring to a four-year college for a bachelor’s degree or going directly into the workforce,” said Kathy Stedman, associate professor of physical education. She emphasized the potential combination of sport management courses with other academic disciplines such as business, communication, and life sciences.

Experiential learning experiences are key components of the degree programs.

The A.S. degree program enables graduates to transfer to a four-year institution, preparing them to pursue careers in youth, scholastic, intercollegiate, and professional athletic organizations, sport facility management, sport media and communication, and fitness management. Core courses will focus on accounting, economics, marketing, communication, and psychosocial theories related to sport.

The A.A.S. degree is designed for individuals interested in entry level positions in the sport, recreation, and fitness industry. Sport psychology, sport sociology, and ethical leadership will be emphasized in the curriculum.

Although not designed as a transfer program, many of its courses may be tailored for transfer to bachelor’s degree programs emphasizing recreation management, fitness promotion management, and coaching education. Experiential learning experiences are key components of both degree programs.

Additional Degrees At Olean MTI

Three additional certificate programs for JCC’s Manufacturing Technology Institute in Olean were announced in spring 2017.

The one-year programs – computer-aided design and computer numerical control, industrial equipment technology, and machine tool technology – join the welding technology certificate program currently offered at the facility.

“Employer need for the programs was determined through discussions with manufacturers in the Cattaraugus County region,” said Jean Schrader, dean of JCC’s science, technology, engineering, and mathematics division.

“Graduates of the programs will have developed skills necessary to either gain employment or enhance career opportunities,” she added. After receiving a certificate, students may also choose to continue their education by completing additional coursework toward an associate’s degree.

“Impending retirements will soon create a shortage of qualified machinists, drafters, engineers, CAD operators, and welders that support industry operations,” noted Jeff Teluk, director of engineering science and technology. “JCC is positioned to provide the education and training needed to meet those industry needs.”

The MTI facility, equipped with a broad range of new welding and machining equipment to prepare students for careers in advanced manufacturing, opened in fall 2016. The Manley Memorial Trust provided funds to purchase three additional welding units for use in JCC's welding technology program.

Scholarship funds, provided by area businesses to support workforce development efforts, are earmarked for students in programs at MTI. Eligible students must be enrolled in at least six credit hours per semester in any of the four certificate programs or must be taking remedial or prerequisite courses to enter those programs.

The IET certificate prepares students to troubleshoot, repair, and maintain electrical, mechanical, hydraulic, and pneumatic equipment used in a manufacturing or facilities environment. The program core focuses on automation systems used in advanced manufacturing and facilities maintenance. Courses emphasize the fundamentals of AC/DC electricity, programmable logic controllers, electric motors and controls, hydraulics and pneumatics, manual and CNC machining, and welding.

Students in the machine tool technology certificate program will become proficient in the operation of basic machine tools such as lathes, milling machines, grinders, drill presses and precision measurement equipment.

The CAD/CNC certificate program prepares students for entry level manufacturing positions requiring skills in engineering drawing, computer-aided design, and computer numerical control.

Career Advantage Program Launched

Career Advantage, a program designed for adult students, at JCC's Jamestown, Olean, and Dunkirk sites was launched in fall 2017.

Students in the Career Advantage program in business administration attend classes one night a week, supplementing their classroom meetings with online instruction. The program is designed to help adults complete a college degree in two years while balancing work and family commitments. A blend of business, computer applications, and social media marketing courses

provide students with skills that can be put to immediate use in the workplace.

"Career Advantage is an excellent alternative for students who do not want a program that is totally online but who can concentrate on two courses as opposed to the four or five they may have in our traditional program," said James Chimenti, a business administration professor who is coordinating the schedule of courses.

"We make advisement, registration, financial aid, and other processes run smoothly for adult students without the hassle that can accompany starting and finishing a degree," he added. "We have involved our partners from four-year colleges in the planning stages to ensure graduates from our program can progress seamlessly to a bachelor's degree."

JCC Awarded \$92,000 Globalization Grant

The U.S. Department of Education awarded JCC a grant of \$92,000 in December 2016 to further the college's comprehensive globalization efforts.

The Undergraduate International Studies and Foreign Language Program (UISFL) grant represents the first year of an anticipated two-year commitment that will provide funds for faculty and curriculum development and expand study abroad opportunities available to JCC students.

Titled "The Global Readiness Continuum: High School to Community College and Beyond," JCC's grant-funded project also engages students enrolled in College Connections, JCC's concurrent enrollment program with regional high schools.

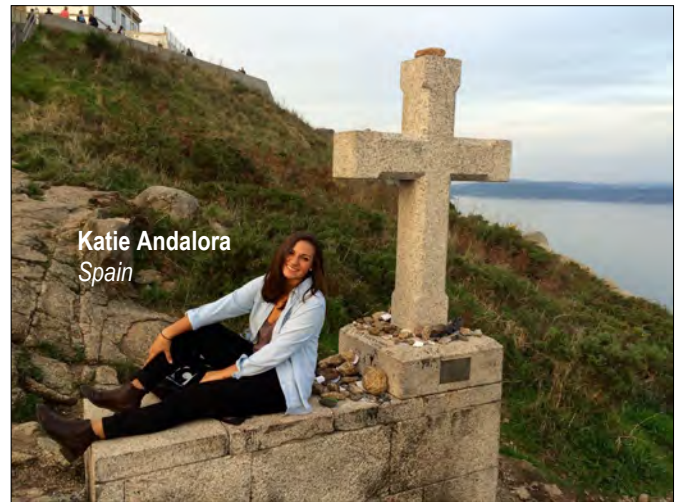
JCC was one of only 36 institutions nationwide to receive the award, which is part of a \$2.8 million fund. The college received similar UISFL grant funding in the 2014-15 and 2015-16 academic years to initiate its globalization efforts.

"The priority of our efforts is the development of global perspectives which will prepare all members of the college community to understand and function within a global context," said Marilyn A. Zagora, JCC's vice president of academic affairs. "Our intent is to encourage a paradigm shift toward globalization as an opportunity to be embraced and celebrated."

"JCC's grant-funded program includes four primary goals," Garifi explained. "The first goal creates a pipeline of 'global-ready' entering college students who understand the value of study abroad and foreign language study to their personal and professional lives and are predisposed to including these elements in their college experiences. Secondly, we seek to expand partnerships between JCC's language/global studies curriculum and other disciplines."

Increasing the number of students pursuing foreign language study and strengthening student connections both locally and globally are the objectives of the grant's third goal. The fourth goal is diversifying the JCC students studying abroad by engaging previously under-served populations.
