Course Title: Contemporary Economic Problems

Course Abbreviation and Number: ECO 1530

Credit Hours: 3

Course Type: Lecture

Course Description: Students will analyze current economic problems while critically evaluating solutions to these problems. Students integrate basic economic concepts and terminology to problems surrounding such issues as the environment, distribution of resources, health care, crime, market power, poverty, discrimination, government price controls, and international trade. This course is not a substitute for ECO 2610-2620.

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Topics Covered:

- Economic Concepts: opportunity costs, Factors of Production, Production Possibilities
 - Supply and Demand: market forces, market equilibrium, market changes- Application of price controls : price ceilings (rent controls) and price floors (minimum wage)
 - Market Forms: Pure competition, monopolistic competition, oligopolies, monopolies- implications of markets: monopoly power (Microsoft, Wal-Mart)
 - Macroeconomic Concepts: GDP, unemployment, inflation, recession- - analysis of current situation
 - Federal Government: fiscal policy, budget deficits- what is currently being done?
 - Monetary Policy: Federal Reserve, interest rates- what is the current situation?
 - International Trade: imports and exports, trade deficits, trade agreements, protectionism
 - The environment: externalities, problems and solutions
 - Healthcare: problems and solutions, private pay, government programs, universal healthcare
 - Economics of Crime: costs of crime, crime prevention programs
 - Education: human capital, school reform issues
 - Poverty and welfare: measuring poverty, government programs
 - Energy Issues: OPEC, alternative energy options
