Course Title: Criminal Procedural Law

Course Abbreviation and Number: CRI 2330

Credit Hours: 3

Course Type: Lecture

Course Description: Studies the criminal law processes necessary for successful criminal investigation including physical and testimonial evidence gathering, arrest, and presentation of an accused to court for trial proceedings. Students are required to apply contemporary U.S. Supreme Court decisions relevant to such topics as arrest, search and seizure, and interrogation.

Prerequisite: ENG 1510, CRI 1510.
