Course Title: Music Theory I

Course Abbreviation and Number: MUS 1570

Credit Hours: 3

Course Type: Lecture

Course Description: Introduces the student to the basic fundamentals of reading and writing music. Students will work with elements of common practice theory and harmony through written assignments and aural skills training. No previous musical experience or skills required.

 - Notation and scoring
 - Introduction to voicing chords in multiple parts
