Transfer Master Agreement

The University of Pittsburgh at Bradford and Jamestown Community College

The University of Pittsburgh at Bradford (UPB) and Jamestown Community College (JCC) set forth the conditions upon which UPB will guarantee admission of students from JCC into UPB's baccalaureate programs. This document sets forth those conditions, which the parties hereby agree to. The requirements that follow apply to all programs at UPB unless otherwise noted.

A. Overview of the agreement

This agreement applies to courses delivered at JCC as of the 2018-2019 academic year. Its purpose is to provide JCC students the opportunity to pursue a Bachelor of Arts (BA), Bachelor of Science (BS), or Bachelor of Science Nursing (BSN) degree at UPB.

B. Provisions for review and termination

1. JCC agrees to promptly notify UPB upon any substantive modification to courses listed in this document, and further agrees that the terms of this agreement will no longer hold unless UPB provides written approval that the curriculum changes do not alter the intent of this agreement.

2. UPB agrees to provide JCC with information about UPB's programs of study and any changes to the curriculum, should they occur. Conditions for admission are stipulated in section C of this document.

3. The terms of this agreement shall remain in effect, except as stipulated in certain previous terms as listed herein, until terminated by either party. Either party may terminate the agreement with or without cause, on the provision of 120 days written notice to the other party.

C. Admission requirements, transfer of credits, and opportunity to graduate

1. UPB agrees that students from JCC will be admitted to their choice of degree program from among those outlined in this document given that they satisfy the following conditions:

a. Completion of up to 75 transferable credits with a minimum grade of "C" = 2.00 in each transferred course.

b. A minimum cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 2.5 (2.6 for Biology Education (7-12); Business, Computer and Information Technology (PK-12); Chemistry Education (7-12); Early Level Education (PK-4); English Education (7-12), Health and Physical Education (PK-12); Mathematics Education (7-12); and Social Studies Education (7-12).

c. Students must meet UPB conduct standards in regard to known behavioral problems.

d. Students must complete the application and deposit requirements by May 1.

JCC students who transfer a minimum of 60 credits with minimum grades of "C" will be admitted to UPB with junior standing. JCC students who enter UPB with at least 54 credit hours that fulfill requirements for any degree program outlined in this document, maintain full-time enrollment of 15-18 credits, register for recommended courses, and earn minimum grades of "C" will fulfill graduation requirements for the bachelor's degree in four full-time fall and spring semesters at UPB unless otherwise specifically noted in this agreement.

This agreement constitutes the entire agreement and terms of understanding among the parties named herein and supersedes any prior agreements or understandings among the parties.
